1.0 **Background and Key Issues** At the meeting of the Council on 24th September 2024, a motion was raised under Any Other 1.1 Business. Under the circumstances, it was referred to the Communities and Wellbeing Committee for consideration. 1.2 Caleb's Cause NI 1.3 "This Council supports the spirit of Caleb's Cause NI, a grass roots movement started by Caleb's mother, Alma White, whose son lives with autism and learning disabilities. At its core, Caleb's Cause aims to close the disparity in opportunities for young adults with disabilities accessing further education opportunities and to develop as individuals. 1.4 Caleb's Cause calls for the introduction of legislation to bring in post-19 Education Health (EHC) and Care Plans for these young people. 1.5 As a show of support this Council will: 1. Pass this motion showing its support for Caleb's cause demonstrating the Council's commitment to improving post-19 provision for individuals with Special Educational Needs. 2. Write to the Minister for Economy, the Minister of Health and the Minister of Education urging them to consider introducing legislation to introduce post-19 Education Health and Care Plans and furthermore asks them to prioritise cross-departmental collaboration on planning and implementing any changes given the cross-cutting nature of this request. 3. Light up Lagan Valley Island in blue and purple to raise awareness and show solidarity with the campaign using the hashtag #CalebsCauseNI on social media posts." 2.0 Recommendations 1. 1.0 Background

- The Good Relations Project Support Fund was developed as a key element of the overall Councils Good Relations Action Plan 2024/25 which receives financial assistance from The Executive Office. This grant scheme aims to promote good relations between people of different religious and political beliefs and different racial groups through programmes delivered by local community and voluntary organisations.
- The Good Relations Action Plan 2024-2025 was approved through committee in September 2024, which included the provision of a grants scheme to the value of £20,000.
- 1.3 The Good Relations Project Support Fund was launched on 6 September 2024 for a period of 3 weeks. Two information sessions were held on 11 September and 17 September.

1.4 Outcomes

- The Good Relations Project Support Fund scheme closed on 23rd September 2024. 24 applications were received and assessed by a panel of officers against the agreed criteria. Of the 24 applications received, 21 were deemed successful totaling £28,431 based on the weighted score of each applicant. In line with the terms and conditions of the grant scheme, 3 applicants were deemed unsuccessful.
- 1.6 A copy of the applications received and outcomes of assessment are attached for Member's information.

1.7 Option for consideration

1.8 The budget for the Good Relations Project Support Fund is £20,000. In order to remain within budget, there is a requirement to reduce all awards by 29.6% of the weighted allocation.

2.0 Recommendation

- 2.1 It is recommended that Members consider and agree:
 - The award of a grant with a 29.6% reduction in the financial allocation to all successful applicants in order to remain within the budget of £20,000; and
 - Furthermore, the unsuccessful applicants will receive feedback and support from officers as required.

The Good Relations Action Plan will deliver programmes and opportunities to increase participation and engagement from all residents within the council area.

The delivery of the action plan is likely to have a positive impact in people living in rural areas by providing access to a number of measures aimed at reducing poverty and social isolation. It may also help address barriers to low paid employment though opening up avenues for on line education and training hence up-skilling the workforce. Lack of transport can also be an issue facing rural dwellers – consideration will be given to this when identifying locations for delivery.

Council has also recognised a need for more new and innovative approaches to dealing with the issues in rural areas which take account of particular circumstances which people in rural areas face. This action plan therefore offers the opportunity, to reduce inequality and broaden community engagement with the ultimate objective to provide better access to community needs whilst improving community links and networks.

In line with the 'Together: Building A United Community' (2013) Strategy, Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council has developed a unique Good Relations Programme for its citizens with the ambition that everyone feels welcome, safe, respected and celebrated. The new action plan will help develop and shape the future Good Relations programme being delivered by the council for the period 2024/25.

What are the intended aims/outcomes the activity/policy/project is trying to achieve?

The proposed Good Relations Action Plan (funded with support through The Executive Office) are to be developed to align with the priority objectives within the T:BUC Strategy including Our Children and Young People, Our Shared Community, Our Safe Community and Our Cultural Expression. In relation to the specific objectives of Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council, the action plan is intended to improve good relations within the council area and ensure all programmes are aligned with the objectives of the T:BUC strategy. The outcomes intended will be to directly address the good relations priorities and needs of the community which are identified through an extensive audit process.

Who is the activity/policy/project targeted at and who will benefit? Are there any expected benefits for specific Section 75 categories/groups from this activity/policy/project? If so, please explain.

The Executive Office's T:BUC strategy is targeted at all citizens in Northern Ireland and sets out specific objectives and priorities that Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council must address through the Good Relations programme. The council's action plan is aimed at improving good relations for all its citizens. However, the nature of good relations work is that certain groups and issues will be specifically targeted in the programmes that are included within the action plan.

The action plan has been developed by the Communities team within Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council as part of the requirements stipulated by The Executive Office towards applications for funding through the District Council Good Relation programme.

Who owns and who implements the activity/policy/project?

The Action Plan and implementation of the associated programmes is the responsibility of Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council. Ultimately, the responsibility for implementation and delivery of the action plan will be led by the Community Services team with input from other council departments.

In 2021, Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council commissioned an independent consultant to undertake a review of the existing Good Relations activities and programmes being delivered by the council, undertake consultation, develop a strategy and establish a draft action plan for the future Good Relations programmes.

This process included the following:

- An on-line external community-based survey was developed to capture the
 perspectives of the wider community. This was advertised through the Council
 Community Services e-zine which was distributed to 235 contacts of community
 organisations and social media and achieved a return of 79 completed surveys
- Consultation workshop for Council Officers; Elected Members; External Stakeholders
- Desk research was undertaken including a review of:
 - Good relations activities previously delivered by the council
 - o Commission on Flags, Identity, Culture and Tradition Report (Dec 2021)
 - New Decade, New Approach
 - Together Building a United Community (The Executive Office)
 - Good Relations A Guide for Local Authorities (Equality Commission Northern Ireland guidance)
 - o Racial Equality Strategy for Northern Ireland
 - Northern Ireland Life and Times Survey 2020
 - o Lisburn & Castlereagh Community Plan 2017-2032

 Sports Accelerator Fund – DEA Sports Funding 2024-25

As part of the DEA Investment Programme, approved by Members, a sporting club support grant 'The Sports Accelerator Fund' (formally The Keep the Ball Rolling Fund) was established. A budget of £100,000 was allocated to this fund. The grant fund aims to support local constituted and affiliated to Sports Lisburn and Castlereagh Clubs through a maximum allocation of £3,000. This can be used for sports equipment, marketing, facility hire, coaches and Club Development posts.

- 1.3 The programme was launched and advertised in June, resulting in 49 applications being received. A panel, consisting of Officers, met and scored the applications of which 3 were deemed ineligible as set out in **Appendix 1**.
- 1.4 The budget for the fund was £100,000 and all successful applications received their allocated award on the basis of the overall % score against the eligible amount applied for.
- 1.5 Clubs who scored 80% or above are recommended to get 100% of the eligible funding requested. To ensure that all eligible clubs receive an allocation, the following thresholds were applied;
 - * Clubs who scored 70% or above to receive 85% of their request,
 - * Clubs who scored 60% or above to receive 80% of their request.
 - * Clubs who scored 50% or above to receive 75% of their request.
- 1.6 Applications deemed ineligible were due to not being affiliated to the Sport Lisburn and Castlereagh or an application fell below the 50% threshold. Ineligible costs also include items such as hotel accommodation, hospitality and transport.
- 1.7 This has resulted in a shortfall of £4,883.00 to accommodate all successful applications at the scored amount. This additional contribution can be accessed through the DEA Investment Programme, as the Director of Leisure and Community Wellbeing has responsibility to redirect small amounts of budget, whilst remaining in the overall budget.

- 2. provide feedback and support to the unsuccessful applicants.

By LCCC introducing such an attractive funding initiative, this may provide more opportunities for woman & girls to take part in Sport & Physical Activity. Some groups previously have typically applied for funding to run female only participation programs such as football, cricket and gymnastics. As part of the scoring matrix/funding criteria clubs are encouraged and rewarded for running programs that target under-represented groups.

Assessors will be reviewing the quality of the proposed applications, looking for clearly articulated benefits and defined beneficiaries. They will be looking at the importance and relevance of the issue and the strength of the idea. This might include the number and range of beneficiary, the degree of benefit, the vulnerability of the target group, any deprivation and/or inequality factors.
